Bridging Borders and Harvesting Opportunities: Food Systems & Economic Impact

This conference promises to be an enlightening exploration of the intricate connections between food systems, economic development, and environmental sustainability.

Laredo's strategic location as a major trade hub enhances its appeal for our conference focused on food systems as Laredo is the number one port in the United States, specifically the busiest inland port for international trade. Therefore, it is a key point of entry for goods into the United States making it a significant player in the food industry.

Laredo offers a warm and welcoming atmosphere that reflects the hospitality of its residents. The city's vibrant cultural scene, with its festivals, music, and art, provides an enriching experience for conference attendees, making it more than just a professional gathering but a cultural immersion.

Our key topics will be:

1 - Crossroads of Trade: Laredo's Role in the Food Supply Chain

This session will highlight Laredo's strategic position as a key trade hub for food systems. Discussion will focus on how the port's operations influence regional and statewide economies, emphasizing its role in connecting producers, distributors, and consumers across borders. At the crossroads of North American commerce, the Port of Laredo is far more than a conduit for goods—it is the vital heart of a binational food system. This session will dissect Laredo's indispensable role as the premier gateway for the flow of nourishment, from produce and grains to proteins, connecting Mexican farms and producers to American dining tables and beyond. We will move beyond the statistics to explore the real-world economic impact: how the port's operations generate jobs, stabilize prices, and fuel the economic vitality of both Texas and Mexico. Our expert panel will discuss the intricate dance of logistics, policy, and innovation required to keep this system resilient, secure, and efficient. Join us for a critical conversation on how this bustling border hub bridges borders to harvest opportunity, ensuring that the food on our plates powers not just people, but entire economies.

2- Food Security is National Security

The U.S. boasts a strong and productive agricultural sector, with Texas ranking as the third largest agricultural state. Yet, food imports remain significant. This session will examine why the U.S. still imports food, what we grow, import, and export, and the economic implications of these dynamics on national food security. The discussion will focus on the economic and security benefits of strengthening local production—that create a robust first line of defense against widespread food insecurity. This discussion challenges the status quo, focusing on how the importance build self-reliant, equitable food economies. This is a critical examination of how building stronger, more equitable local and cross-border food networks directly harvests economic resilience and nourishes healthier communities.

3- Feeding Resilience: Building Healthier, Self-Reliant Communities

This discussion will explore the intersections between diet, health, economic opportunity, and community strength. We will consider how to create a food system where access to healthy food is a right, not a privilege. Topics include community-based food initiatives, urban farming, and the importance of local production and bolstering resilience against food insecurity. We will move beyond the concept of "access" focusing on how to build a food system where wellness and nourishment are guaranteed for all. What if our local food system was the engine of community health and economic prosperity? We'll highlight models that create jobs, keep capital within the community, and strengthen resilience against food insecurity. This session will also delve into the powerful connection between what we eat, how it's grown, and the economic vitality of our communities.
